Periodontitis is the most common inflammatory disease that disproportionately affects low-income patients. Traditional, non-surgical periodontal therapy has focused on quadrant therapy as the only treatment option. However, full-mouth disinfection (FMD) has been shown to be as effective as quadrant therapy to treat periodontitis. This session will highlight the history of FMD and the evidence demonstrating its effectiveness as a treatment option for periodontitis.
