VRP Program: Eligible Provider Types

- The Volunteer and Retired Providers (VRP) Program cannot cover providers with a registration or certification. The Program can only cover <u>licensed providers</u>, as outlined below. Third year residents do qualify under their limited license as long as volunteer coverage hours are limited and not regularly scheduled hours.
- The VRP Program cannot cover students or associates. Liability for students and associates typically comes from preceptors.

Key Definitions

License: A method of regulation by which the state grants permission to persons who meet predetermined qualifications to engage in a health profession. The qualifications are set by law and without a license the practice of the specific health profession would be unlawful. Licensure protects the scope of practice and the healthcare professional's title.

Certification: A type of credential. Certifications may be a voluntary process by which the state grants recognition to an individual who has met certain qualifications. Some certifications are required before the person can practice a healthcare profession. The qualifications for each certified profession are set in law.

Registration: A process by which the state maintains an official roster of names and addresses of the practitioners in a given profession and, if required, the location, nature and operation of the healthcare activity practiced.
